


# TENNESSEE QSO PARTY 2020




Wow, what a party!

The 2020 Tennessee QSO Party has shattered participation records. We've destroyed the old record of 249 entries, set in 2017 – this year we had 415. We've destroyed the old record of 32,974 QSOs, reported in 2010 – this year we had 38,466. Most important, the Prime Directive was fully upheld – everyone had FUN.

The band split for 2020 was the same as 2019 – 20% on 80 meters; 64% on 40; 15% on 20. 120 QSOs were reported on 160 meters and a handful each on 15 & 10. One mobile operator used 2 meters to work his driver in each county, adding a QSO and a multiplier in each. (yes, this is permitted) Another operator worked a handful of locals on 6 meters, adding one multiplier and several QSOs.

The CW/phone split came closer to equal, with 62% of QSOs on CW and 38% on phone. 150 digital-mode QSOs were reported this year.


OM2VL's 40-meter antenna system. Stacked 3-element Yagis at 24m (80') and 46m. (150')




Laci's 20-meter system. Three stacked 6-element Yagis at 12m (40'), 25m (80'), and 38m. (125')

Two TN stations were calling CQ on the same exact frequency, both answered to my call, both confirmed my contact info, only logged dominant station as weaker one didn't get full callsign soon after QSO so deleted and moved on. During contest same thing happened again w/two TN stations both confirming with me only getting partial callsign. As you know, pace of contest, weaker signal gets squashed. Later in day had three stations said worked in past, so I missed a few TN stations in log that I could hear.

Had a good time operating as a portable station in Pennsylvania. Too bad the upper bands were closed; looking forward to next year.

AB3GS: ARRL Field Day and Maryland QSO Party were my first two contests. TNQP was my third. Going up and down the 40 meter SSB band, I was struck by how polite, professional, kind, and considerate the hams of Tennessee are. I listened to one person talk for five minutes with someone from New York about their rigs, antennas, and goals. Only then did he call for another contest QSO!

Although I still have mike fright, occasionally brain freeze, and thought I should rush through the exchange, I can say I learned more about my rig, much more on how a QSO could and should be conducted, and thoroughly enjoyed the Tennessee QSO Party. Many thanks, 73.

AC4G: Seemed like participation was minimal maybe due to Labor Day holiday. Otherwise, made many QSOs outside Tennessee and into Europe. Noise at this location was high, but did not hurt receiving too bad even though there were some weak ones I could not pull out. Thanks for all the QSOs.

**DL3DXX:** Propagation was OK. Did not try 15m but last QSO on 20m was 2347z. Good activity kept me busy most times.

Mobiles: Good number of mobiles increased the fun a lot. Most mobiles were present on 20m during afternoon. Worked K4O, K4ZGB, N4ZZ, W4AN, W4NZ, W4PV and W9WI. KY4L and W3TB were not heard because did not operate 20m and disappeared when 40m started to open for Europe.

Sometimes it was hard to break U.S. pileups, possible after longer tries on 40m but mostly impossible on 80m where every little pistol in U.S. with 50 watts and a dipole outrivals us in Europe.

Thank you for a well-done party. Down to 3 needed TN counties now, so it's something left for next year.

#### Notes:

Propagation was pretty long on 40 during the contest. (I only worked *one* Tennessee station on 40) In AB1A's case this led to several encounters with two or more Tennessee stations calling CQ on the same frequency. They couldn't hear each other. This is difficult to avoid. If you find callers who seem "out of sync" or non-responsive, there's a pretty good chance there's someone else on the same frequency.

As mentioned above, "distributed multiops" are permitted in the TNQP, and in the case of K4TCG it is not necessary for all equipment to be in the same county. This is why our HQ station sent Cheatham, Dickson, Washington, and Williamson. They weren't mobile – there were four fixed stations.

Thanks to all for the participation; here's hoping we shatter records again in 2021!
